TRAIL RIDE ESSENTIALS



- Cell phone with GPS Navigation App
- Satellite Tracking Device
- KCF USWE Hydration Pack with an electrolyte mix
- Nutrition/Food
- Chapstick & Sunblock
- Small LED Flashlight with Strobe
- KCF First Aid Kit
- Biodegradable Wipes
- Silicone Self Healing Tape
- Quick Steel
- Knife
- Zip Ties / Wire
- Tow Strap
- Duct Tape
- Fuel Hose
- Lighter or Waterproof Matches

Tools, Nuts and Bolts specific to your bike:

(Any tool you have used to work on your bike in your garage, bring with you on the trail)

- Mini T Handle with 8,10,12,13mm
- Open End Wrench 8, 10, 12, 13/14
- Misc Bolts specific to your bike
- Small Flat Head Screwdriver
(for adjusting suspension and carburetor)
- Small Channel Locks
(big enough for axle nuts and bolts)
- Small Wire Cutters
- Spark Plug and Wrench
- Clutch Lever

Tools for Advanced Mechanics:

- Chain Breaker
- Masterlinks
- Valve Core Remover
- Set of Tire Spoons
- Radiator Cap
- Spoke Wrench
- Patch Kit or Spare Front Tube
- Small Tire Pump

TRAIL RIDING ETIQUETTE

- Take it easy in the parking lot. Parking lot is for parking, not showing off and hurting yourself or other bystanders.
- Stay on the marked trail
- Follow at a safe distance, don't ride in the dust and don't pass for no reason within the group.
- Be aware of other motorcycles, bikes, hunters, quads, UTVs, Jeeps, etc. Move to the right side for oncoming traffic.
- If you see someone stopped, check to see if they are okay.
- If someone in your group is missing, have the group wait in one spot and send one rider to look for the missing rider.
- Don't stop in the middle of the trail, especially in a blind curve, hill or dusty area.
- Be kind. Be remembered as a person, not an idiot on a dirt bike. Be respectful to ranchers and animals.
- Leave gates as you found them.
- Communicate. Use Two-Way Radios in the group or at least with the first rider and last rider to direct turns and inform if a gate was open or closed. If not using radios, stop and mark the corner and relay gate info before proceeding out of sight of the rider behind you.

Hand Signals:

- When you see oncoming traffic, slow to a reasonable speed. If you are alone or the last one in the group, hold up your hand in a fist.
- If there are riders behind you, hold up fingers indicating how many riders are behind you. If riding in large groups, the lead rider should stop and hold the oncoming traffic until all your riders have passed.
